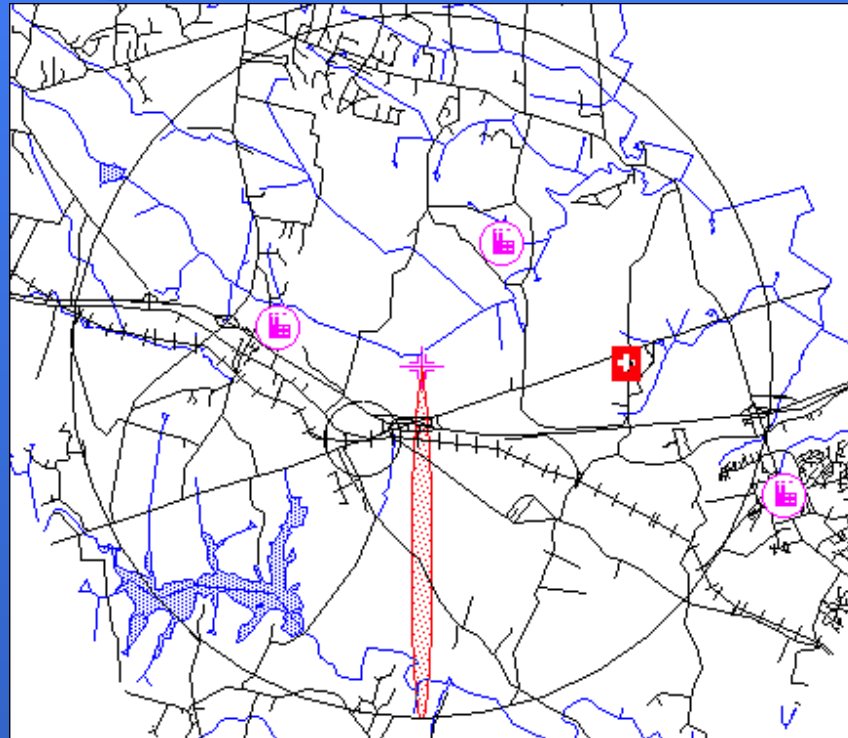
What is a Risk Management Program (RMP)?

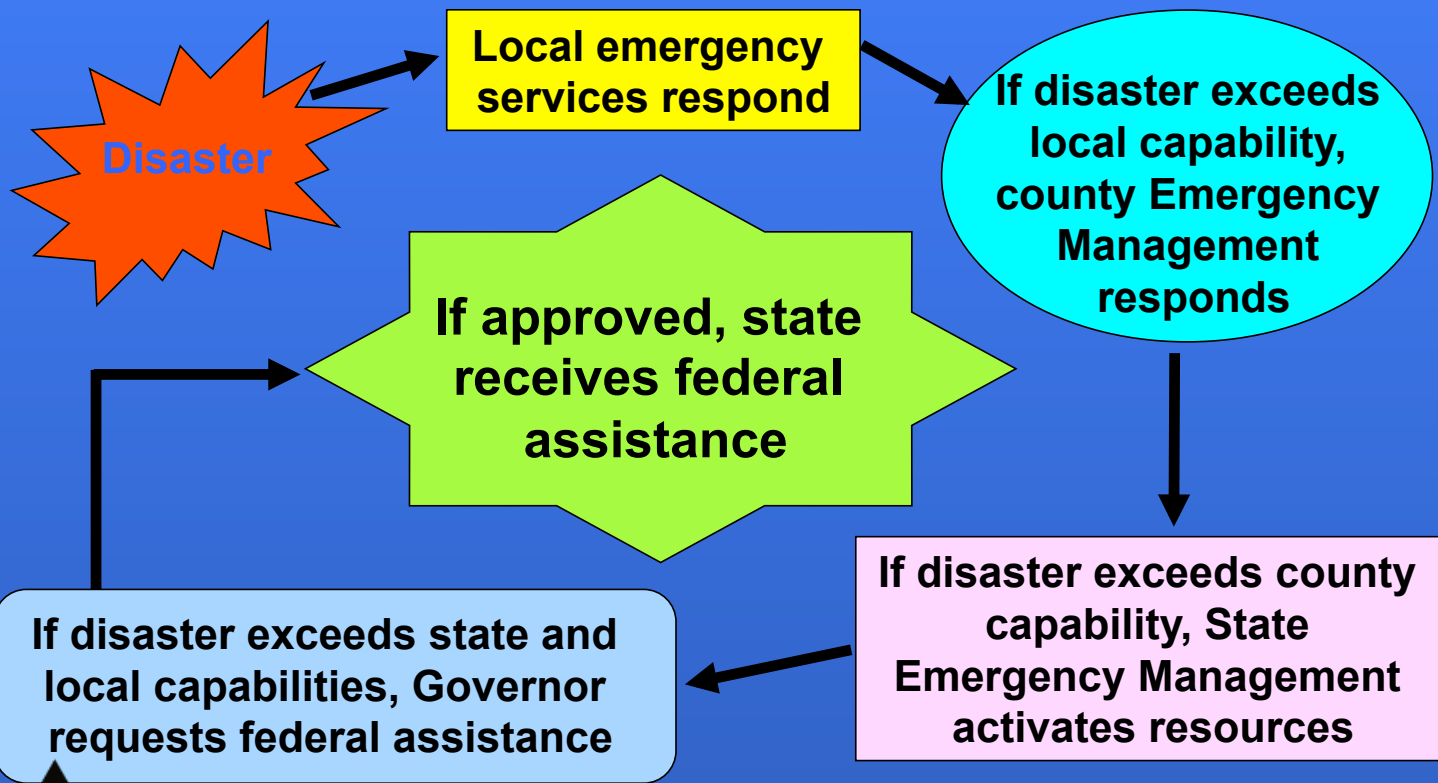


Emergency Response Planning

- Coordinate annually and update changes
- Document the name, contact info, and date of the coordination activity
